

Hilltop Butterfly List



Butterfly species found in or near the Hilltop Reservation, or elsewhere in northern New Jersey, are listed here along with their relative in-season abundance and main caterpillar host plants. Some rare occurrences have been left off, and, as butterfly populations vary from year to year, some species may increase in the future, or disappear as habitats change. Lastly, as Hilltop sightings were not systematically compiled in the past, this checklist is a work in progress – we have incorporated older ecological studies, as well as more recent informal reports.
